A LESSON IN HISTORY

IT is 50 years since Clarence High was established as the first comprehensive high school on Hobart's Eastern Shore.

Eddie Smith, the founding headmaster, recently returned to open the new Principals' Gallery.

Before drawing the curtain to reveal the five portraits, Mr Smith, now in his 96th year, noted that in this collection of photographs, he was "in more distinguished company than in the rogues' gallery of fishing mates" in which he had previously featured.

Master of ceremonies Nicole Hodges began the proceeding by welcoming the former principals, past and present staff members, friends of the school and students.

Rebecca Smith and Hilary Baker then outlined the unfolding of the Principals' Gallery project.

In early April, school chaplain Kerry Lee gathered a group of students who started their research by interviewing former principals.

The school's 50th year was the perfect time to reflect on its history.

Over several months, the past principals reminisced about their eras.

The students wrote short biographies of each principal, and these now accompany a photograph of them all.

event for the year was an open day for the school's former students. Current students led guided tours, and many old scholars commented on how different the buildings looked.

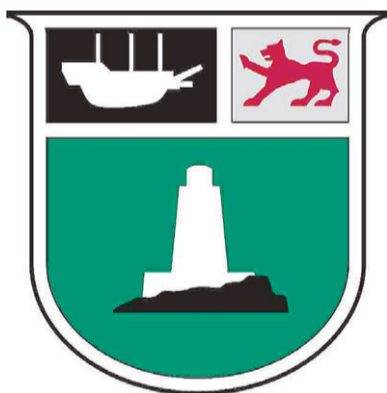
As part of the entertainment senior drama students showed off their performance skills, and the "French Mistress" recreated an old-style lesson for a class of silver-haired students, who

The other major celebratory event was the 50th anniversary dinner at the Wrest Point Casino on August 6. This was the exact date that Clarence High School was officially opened by education minister Bill Nielson in 1959. The

Giant Hamsters, the band of former Clarence teacher David Minchin, entertained the crowd.

The skilled swing-dancing of the "pioneers" — the first intake of students from the era of the mini-skirt, the Morris Mini-Minor and the Barbie doll — put younger ex-pupils to shame with their spectacular turns on the dance floor.
