Erin Sussems, Grade 10: I think there is an aspect of truth to the label but it's really just a stereotype.



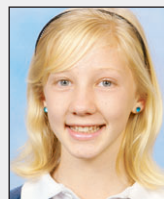
Holly Jacobson, Grade 7: I think it would be true for teenagers in all past generations.

SCHOOL GAINS \$4M BOOST

TAROONNA High will benefit from a \$4m redevelopment made possible through the Federal Government's Building the Education Revolution grant and the State Government's capital works program.

Due to start in October and slated for completion in July 2010, the redevelopment will include a new science building and refurbishment of the home economics and the materials, design and technology (MDT) areas.

The 660m² science building will include a collaborative learning area, two new general classrooms, a greenhouse and two fully equipped laboratories.

Each room will be equipped with an interactive whiteboard which will assist teachers in integrating innovative technologies into the curriculum.

The building will have wireless internet access, allowing students with their own laptops to take advantage of flexible learning areas

equipped with informal lounges and modular furniture, in order to "get rid of the 'egg crate' mentality," according to principal David Hamlett.

"It encourages students to work together," Mr Hamlett said.

The new science block will incorporate solar panels and possibly a wind turbine to reduce Taroonna's impact on the environment.

Students will be able to see the building's energy produc-

tion and use through the building management system. The building's style makes no mistake about the purpose of the facilities.

The design aims to create the feeling of a research facility; an environment where teachers can share classes and students can direct their own learning, allowing them to achieve to their fullest because they are enjoying themselves.

The MDT and home economics areas use "high end technologies" to produce

high end products.

Examples of this philosophy include the purchase of two industrial cooktops in the fully equipped stainless steel technical kitchen.

The MDT area will feature several high-tech machines, one of which will allow students to create quality three-dimensional models from scratch.

Students and staff look forward to working together in their state-of-the-art learning areas.
